When Pope John XXIII gave the archbishop of Canterbury a tour of the Vatican, the archbishop remarked, "This is a large operation. How many people work here?" Pope John said, "About half of them."

This weekend we observe Labor Day and paradoxically on Labor Day we do not labor. But this leisure invites us to engage in the most difficult aspect of labor, to search for its meaning. Our modern culture focuses on the financial and social dimensions of work, seldom reflecting on the spiritual meaning of our labors. In fact, a common attitude is that our work is unrelated to our faith, that the two are different arenas of life: we work during the week; we go to church on Sunday.

Christians work not only for financial security and personal fulfillment, but also as an expression of our faith. Work was an integral part of the life and message of Christ. Jesus is remembered as the Good Shepherd, a laborer. He was identified as a carpenter. For his apostles he chose not churchmen but fisherman. Most of his parables are about farming and fishing and financing.

When Peter needed money for taxes, Jesus did not produce it miraculously. Instead he told him to go catch a fish, to labor at his profession. After the Resurrection when Jesus was preparing breakfast for the Apostles, he didn't say "come and get it." He asked them to bring the fish they had caught. And he was disturbed by unemployment. Recall how the master of the vineyard went into the marketplace and said repeatedly, "Don't stand here idle. Go into the vineyard and work."

Work is an expression of human dignity. Work allows us to care for ourselves and those we love, and by our productivity to contribute to the good of our community. People without work lack one of the major avenues for self-expression and self-fulfillment. The most noble and rewarding value of work is the effort of the laborer who gives of himself or herself for the good of the community.

Scripture teaches that God does not work in the world apart from us. We are his stewards. He raises children through mothers and fathers. He heals through doctors and nurses. He imparts knowledge through teachers and tutors. He builds through carpenters and craftsmen. Whatever your profession, you are laboring in the vineyard of the Lord. Retired seniors might wonder how all this applies to them. Retirement is work, the critical work of understanding the meaning of the labors of one's life.

Christ taught that work is not the be-all and end-all of life. He knew the importance of rest and renewal. He invited his apostles to come away and rest awhile. Christianity understands the paradox that on Labor Day we do not labor. Christ taught that prayer was an integral part of the work of his Father by his own life of prayer. The word "liturgy" means the "work of the people." We do not make our living by this work of prayer, but it is the work that gives meaning to our living. Your daily work, it is only a part-time job. Your full-time job is becoming the person that God wants you to be.

If we labor only for material rewards, we miss a deeper dimension of our work. As the Psalmist wrote, "Unless the Lord builds the house, they labor in vain who build it. Unless the Lord guards the city, in vain does the watchman keep vigil." (Ps 127:1)

PLENARY INDULGENCE GIVEN WHEN VISITING A BASILICA

The faithful may obtain a plenary indulgence by visiting a minor basilica. An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment for a previously forgiven sin.
